

World War 1 Roll of Honour

Birmingham City Police

PC C181 Frederick William Roden LLOYD

Guardsman 26141 Coldstream Guards

Frederick was born on 14th July 1890, in Ross, Herefordshire and in 1911 was residing with his widowed mother Emma at 17 Lynmore Avenue, Oldfield Park, Bath, he was a painter

8th January 1914 Frederick joined Birmingham City Police as a signaller and was allocated warrant number 8436, collar number PC C181 and was posted to the C Division

8th June 1913 Frederick married Louisa Jones of 35 Sladebrook Avenue, Oldfield Park, Bath. Until her marriage she was employed at Messrs Kings in Milsom Street, Bath in the millinery department.

30th April 1914 Frederick and Louisa's son Kenneth was born.

23rd April 1918, Frederick resigned to join HM Forces as Guardsman 26141 Coldstream Guards

9th December 1918 Frederick suffered a gunshot wound to his left hand whilst in his billet but it was declared an accident

25th April 1919 Frederick re-joined BCP after service with HM Forces and was issued a new warrant number of 8959

4th June 1924 Frederick was complimented for rendering first aid

9th December 1928 Frederick was fined £1 for neglect of duty in that he did without good and sufficient cause omit promptly and diligently to attend to and investigate and report a matter which it was his duty to report a collision in which a motor lorry collided with a tramway standard in Birchfield Road, Aston, at 6.50am on Sunday 9th December 1928

25th September 1936 a decision was made that Frederick was no longer medically fit to continue and perform police duties after long bouts of sick leave with rheumatism of the feet and arthritis. He received a medical police pension of £112 14s 1d per annum and on 8th November 1936 Frederick retired from the police

13th November 1939, Frederick's condition had been monitored annually, but on this date, a report was submitted by Superintendent Buckby stating he had caused quiet enquiries to be made on Frederick which ascertained he was working as a work's policeman at Kings Norton Metals (I.C.I) Kings Norton having left the Royal Ordnance Works at Hereford here he had previously secured employment in January 1939. Frederick was now residing at 9 Heathleigh Road, West Heath, Kings Norton which is near his employment. His general health was very good and had had no reason to visit a doctor for over a year but had slight attacks of rheumatism and arthritis, especially after unusual long spells of duty or working in his garden but hadn't lost any time from work. He was not exposed to bad weather and stated he was still not fit for service in the police. He no longer had to be monitored and would continue to receive his medical pension of £112 14s 1d

24th October 1991, Frederick died and his funeral took place on the 30th October. His wife had predeceased him, he had been residing with his son Kenneth.

1958 Louisa sadly died in Hereford
